We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER), which provides key information on the 2011-2012 educational progress for the Medicine and Community Health Academy at Cody. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) and teacher quality. For 2011-2012, Medicine and Community Health Academy at Cody did not make Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) because:

We did not attain target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in English Language Arts.

- Only 31.3% of all of our students; 31.7% of Black Students and 28.6% of our Economically Disadvantaged students met the AYP State Objective in reading.

We did not attain target achievement goals for all subgroups of students in mathematics.

- Only 3.1% of all of our students; 3.2% of Black Students and 3.6% of our Economically Disadvantaged students met the AYP State Objective in mathematics.

We are actively working to address our school's issues. Medicine and Community Health Academy at Cody (MCH) is a new small school in its third year of conception. We will have our first graduating class in the 2012-2013 school year. Our focus on Medicine and Community Health attracts students who are interested in pursuing careers in similar fields. The curriculum is designed to prepare students to study college level courses in math,

science and the medical fields. The students are provided extra support in the classroom, and after school, to keep them on track with completing course requirements. In the 2012-2013 school year, we will engage in the Reading Apprentice program to help students read complex text. Students are encouraged to attend school through attendance incentives, class challenges and a teacher advocate for each student. The counselor provides college awareness and uses data to customize Educational Development Plans, which are updated each semester to make sure students, are on task for graduation. With these measures in place, Medicine and Community Health Academy at Cody will be on track to meet the States requirements for AYP.

Our school will become part of the Self-Governing Schools Initiative during the 2012-2013 school year.

Parent Involvement

Parents are invited to volunteer at the school, assist with the School Improvement Plan and join the students in various community projects. Parents are encouraged to attend the annual Health Care Conference, school assemblies and special parent field trips as well as student trips. Workshops are held during the school year to make parents aware of the educational curriculum design, and to provide support with learning activities that will improve student math and reading skills. Additionally, parents/guardians you can become involved in the successful education of your son/daughter by helping them get S.M.A.R.T. - establishing goals, which are:

Specific – What, Why and How

Measurable - “If you can’t measure it, you can’t manage it.” Help your son/daughter measure their progress, stay on track and reach their target dates.

Attainable - Help your son/daughter make the commitment to take the small steps to accomplish the goals they have set.

Realistic - Is it “do-able?”- Help your son/daughter understand that do-able does not mean easy. It means that they are able to push themselves to acquire the skills and knowledge necessary to meet their goals.

Timely – Help your son/daughter set a time limit. “Fixing to” or “getting ready to” - are not viable points in time. Whatever the goal may be – Graduation?! - Help your son/daughter establish the urgency to begin now – Take action. Process for Assigning Pupils to the School

During the 2011-2012 school year, Detroit Public Schools implemented the “Open Enrollment Initiative.” This initiative allows students to elect to attend any Detroit Public School without being required to live within the boundary for that school. The “Open Enrollment Initiative” does not apply to the Examination High Schools, or Application Schools. Parents may enroll their child(ren) in the school of their interest as long as the school has not reached capacity for their particular grade. Enrollment preference is given to students who live within the boundary of a school. Access to the Core Curriculum

The instructional strategies and grade level expectations are aligned to the State standards and the NAEP. This represents the core curriculum, which is supported by the texts, materials, computer software and other school level resources used daily in the classrooms. All of the professional development activities are aligned to the core curriculum.

The implementation is a process delineated in the District Plan. This plan serves as the framework for each school's academic achievement plan.

The frequent monitoring of the implementation of these plans are conducted by the school diagnostic visits, review of the benchmark assessments, use of the teacher evaluation tool and adherence to the pacing calendar.

The variances from the State plan can be found in the grade level expectations, which are also aligned to the higher standards of NAEP.

A Summer Parent University is offered with classes to increase parenting skills, early childhood literacy, adult literacy and GED. During the school year, the Regional Parent Resource Center is a vehicle for parents and other community members to participate in regular and on-going informational and participatory sessions focused on curriculum and instruction. Learning Village (an online instructional management system), Web updates and semi-annual progress reports are a means to disseminate information to parents and community.

Detroit Public Schools Core Curriculum is currently under revision. Pacing Charts and Curriculum guides will be posted to the Division of Teaching and Learning under the Leadership page of our web-site in the near future.

The Detroit Public Schools' Office of Research, Evaluation, Assessment and Accountability has developed a data collection system which has enabled the District to comply with the Annual Education Report criteria of identifying the number and percent of students represented by parents at Parent-Teacher Conferences.

- 1.0 Data from the PTC Forms represent “parent interactions” with teachers, per school, per card-marking.
- 2.0 Parent Interaction Definition: During Parent-Teacher Conferences (and in some instances school open houses) Schools/Teachers are advised to have each parent participant provide a parent signature—a parent may not sign for a student if they did not talk about that student.
- 3.0 Several DPS schools had a very high percentage of reported parent interactions. This may be due to a number of reasons. In at least seven (7) instances, the calculated percentages are in excess

of 100%. In each instance, each of these seven (7) schools is an elementary school or a Foundation for Early Learners School with a large parent turnout at each of the required conferences. If during each conference, one (1) parent with two (2) students enrolled in the school visited three (3) teachers for each of their two (2) students, this would count as six (6) parent interactions, thus increasing the base number and resulting percentage.
